New Bus Service Established Chambley AFEX For Chambley School Kids

A newly established bus service, between the base trailer park and the dependent's school, was inaugurated at Chambley Air Base last Monday, according to Captain Ward J. Cattron, Commercial Transportation Officer. The new service will eliminate the necessity for youngsters, who have been walking to school in the past, to cross the traffic congested main-gate road.

Since the new service is being provided by a French commercial firm, a naminal fee of 1000 francs per month will be charged for each child utilizing the transportation. "With four trips each day" said Capt. Cattron, "this fee amounts Capt. Cattron. to less than five cents per trip."

Parent's may purchase bus rransportation Office for the month of December, between the 12th and 21st of this month. Hereafter, tickets for each month may be purchased between the 21st and the last day each respective preceding month.

Minimum Mailing Requirements Listed By Base Postal Officer

eliminate considerable confusion over the mailing of parcels from overseas areas to the Continental United States, Hawaii, and Alaska, 2nd Lt. Allen H. Walker, Commander of the local Postal Detachment, recently announced the minimum requirements, permitted

by postal regulations.

Minimum size requirements
provide that every parcel must
be large enough to permit the following indorsements on the FACE of the parcel: Address, return address, postage stamps, customs inspection indicia, customs inspection indicia, postal inspection indicia, and mail class stamp. (ie: parcel post or air mail).

Parcels cannot exceed 100 inches in length and girth combined, and may noweight. not exceed 70 pounds in

Both a forwarding and return address must appear and or cravons cannot be used.

or crayons cannot be used, however, in addressing parcels. Packages which rattle or in which the movement of the contents can be detected will not be accepted for mailing. Shipping containers must be strong enough to retain and protect their contents from the weight of other mails, and containers should be of containers should be of sufficient size to hold the goods, with enough space for cushioning material.

Wooden boxes are preferable for mailing pusposes, however, boxes of heavy corrugated or solid fiber board, kraftboad or chipboard may

be used.

Lt. Walker pointed-out that considerable time can be saved at the parcel post window, if base personnel will follow the above listed requirements prior to arrival at the Post Office.

7. Me to revictual her day by day.


- 8. Should she chance to be blown on her beam ends by winds of misfortune, me to stand by her and see her righted.




